

MRSS Term 3 Curriculum Overview: Yr 3



<u>English</u>



In this English unit, students listen to, read, and compare different perspectives. They will develop skills in narrative structure, sentence types, and editing for meaning and punctuation. In reading, students will deepen their understanding of inferencing, vocabulary, and text analysis through text-dependent questions.

<u>Assessment</u>: Students will create a written retell of a familiar narrative from the perspective of another character in the text.

<u>Mode:</u> Written

<u>Maths</u>

In this Maths unit, students use formal units of time to estimate, compare, and measure the duration of events. They represent money values and unit fractions in various ways and apply mathematical modelling to solve practical multiplication and division problems.

<u>Assessment:</u> Students demonstrate this ability to apply these skills accurately in real-life contexts. <u>Mode:</u> Practical + short answer.

<u>Science</u>

In this Science unit, students explore Earth's movement to explain everyday phenomena like day and night, sunrise and sunset, and shadows. They will identify observable and nonobservable features of Earth and compare its size with the sun and moon.

<u>Assessment:</u> Students will create a presentation to communicate their understandings about Earth and its rotation. They will also explain everyday observations such as day/night, sunrise/sunset and shadows. <u>Mode:</u> Practical + Multimodal





In this HASS unit, students explore how and why places are similar and different by identifying connections between people and place characteristics at a local scale.

<u>Assessment:</u> Students will compare two places to describe the similarities and differences. Students will also explain the importance of making decisions democratically, the role of rules in the community. <u>Mode:</u> Investigation

<u>HPE</u>

In this Physical Education unit, students will refine fundamental movement skills such as overarm, shoulder, and chest throwing, as well as catching, and apply these skills in various game situations.

<u>Assessment:</u> Students demonstrate fundamental movement skills and their understanding of strategies required for net game situations. <u>Mode:</u> Practical



<u>Music</u>

In this unit, students make and respond to music exploring songs of Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander peoples, and songs since the arrival of the First Fleet in Australia.

<u>Assessment:</u> Students compose and respond to Australian music. <u>Mode:</u> Practical

Japanese

In this unit, students will learn to describe a mascot by focusing on its colour, size, shape, and character. <u>Assessment:</u> No summative assessment.

<u>The Arts</u>

In this Visual Arts, students explore Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artworks using symbolic patterns, creating Rarrk paintings and x-ray prints with foam block printing

<u>Assessment:</u> Students will use exploration of artists' work as inspiration for artworks. <u>Mode:</u> Practical

In Drama, Students develop voice and movement skills to plan, perform, and respond to a drama.

<u>Assessment:</u> Students will device, perform and respond to a drama based on The Lorax.
